THE TRUTH ABOUT BAIL REFORM

For years, the mainstream media, special interest groups and powerful politicians have lead Texans to believe the bail system is unfair and unnecessary.

Was she a threat to society? No." They frame Jessie as an innocent grandmother thrown in jail with an unreasonable and unattainable bail amount - but the truth is much more revealing.
